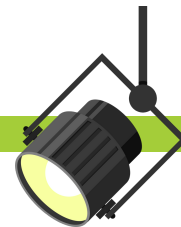

Who has influenced you the most in Life?

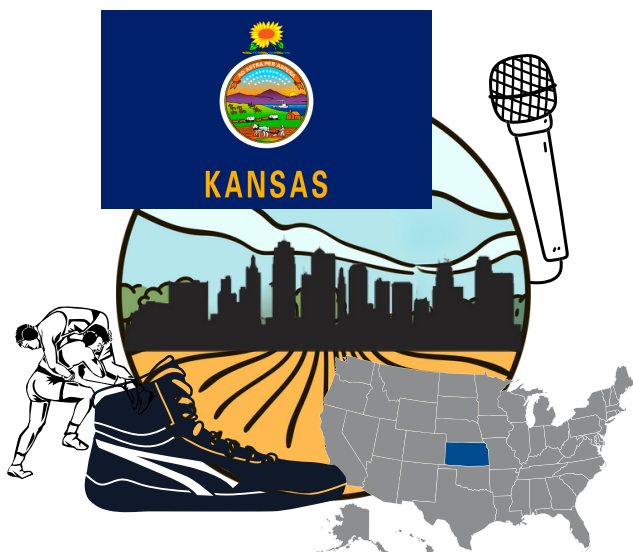
"My family and wrestling. Wrestling has always given me a spot and my family has helped me get there."

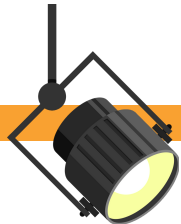
Do you have any interest and/or hobbies in your free time?

What do you do for fun/relaxation outside of the PCC Community?

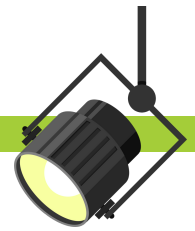
“I like to golf and usual try to get on the course 2 days a week. I enjoy anything sports related and once I retire, my wife and I hope to do some traveling. “

Lisa Perez-Miller

Lisa Perez-Miller, Vice President of Students/Enrollment Management, is retiring at the end of the 2023 calendar year after almost four decades at Pratt Community College.

Lisa started her career at PCC in an interim position in December 1984. However, she quickly landed a full-time permanent position as the Director of Public Information in January of that following year. Since then, she found herself in multiple student-centered professional positions encompassing enrollment management. As with all her roles at PCC, Lisa's legacy is "trying to help others be the best they can be, live life to the fullest, and celebrate life and people."



Before coming to PCC, Perez-Miller earned her bachelor's degree in fine arts from Kansas State University. Since her time at PCC, she completed her master's degree in education from Wichita State University.

Lisa's fondest memories involve people. "It's all about the people as they create a culture and dynamic at the college," Perez-Miller said.

When asked about the support she received from the presidents she has served under, Perez-Miller said she has served under five presidents and is blessed to have always been supported by executive leadership and executive partners.

Perez-Miller expressed her appreciation for the opportunity to serve.

"For those that are given much in life, much is expected. I am blessed, and it is important to pay it forward, give back, and leave things better than you find them."

Some notable accomplishments during her tenure include serving on several Pratt Community College professional teams, including co-chair of the Higher Learning Commission Leadership Team (for accreditation); coordinator/facilitator of the Campus Equity Framework and DEI initiatives, Student Leadership Council advisor, and member of President's Cabinet, Instructional Council, Financial Working Group, and Collaboration & Planning Council. She chairs the college's program review initiative, Services and Programs under Review (SPuR). She is co-chair of the Return to Campus Task Force, Title IX Coordinator, and Chief Diversity Officer. She serves on the Kansas Board of Regents' Chief Diversity Officer's Council and is a Kansas Chief Student Affairs Administrator member. Lisa is a Kansas Community College Leadership Institute (KCCLI) graduate. In 2014, she was selected as a Peer Reviewer for the Higher Learning Commission (HLC).

RETIREMENT NEWS

In 2023, she was awarded the Essential Leader Award by HLC for her service with the Peer Corp. In 2020, Lisa received the Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society's Distinguished College Administrator Award at the national level. She was also awarded the National Association for Student Personnel Administrators (NASPA) Community Colleges Division's Community College Professional Award nationally. Lisa also received the award in 2019 from NASPA's Region IV-West organization. A state volunteer with the Miss Kansas Organization (MKO) since 1986, Lisa served from 2000 - 2018 as Co-Executive Director and President. She currently serves as an MKO advisor to the executive team. Lisa is past president of the Miss Kansas Scholarship Foundation Board of Directors and an MKO Diversity Task Force member. She is also an MKO judge's consultant and trainer, community service initiative (CSI) advisor, and a preparation team member for Miss America and the Miss Kansas year of service. Lisa is a past National Association of Miss America State Pageants Board of Directors member, serving 11 years on the national board. She has judged numerous Miss America state competitions since 1998 and continues to volunteer and prep candidates nationwide with interview preparation.

When asked about her after-retirement plans, Perez-Miller said boredom is not on the menu! She plans to continue being involved in community efforts and take some time to explore some of her hobbies like photography, antiques, shopping, teaching leadership development, jewelry-making, and all things Kansas-related (to name a few)!

GRANT AWARDED

The Performing Arts Summer Camp received a grant from the Georgene Wade Charitable Fund back in mid-October. This fund goes towards the program, which encourages students to actively participate and grow through the art of theatre.

“Our Summer Music Theatre Camp is for kids ages three through finishing fifth grade. The camp is two weeks long, and throughout this time the campers work to produce a musical,” Beck said.

This grant was presented by Laurie Stroda, member of the Georgene Wade Charitable Fund committee, which is a group that honors late Pratt resident Georgene Wade by giving back to the youth in the community of Pratt. Ms. Stroda, presented a grant of \$290 to Beck and the children, which will go towards purchasing new camp supplies.

“Some of the latest musicals we have done are Finding Nemo Jr. and Moana Jr.. The campers learn songs, dances and staging, make parts of their own costumes, play games, and learn science lessons related to the theme of the musical,” said Beck. Beck also spoke of the numerous benefits that the camp offers to the children. The camp not only allows the children to learn the intricacies of theatre, but also to form and create friendships and bonds with each other.

The summer children's theatre camp has been a long tradition at Pratt Community College. Beck said that, in 2012, they decided to lengthen the camp's time frame so a full musical could be produced. Since then, the camp has created successful musicals every year that provide great entertainment for the city of Pratt.

“Not everyone enjoys just sports. This camp gives people who love music and acting a chance to shine. It also helps to create well-rounded kids.” Once a kid completes fifth grade, their experience with the summer camp doesn't end, Beck said. She said that, once a kid becomes a sixth grader, they become a junior leader for the camp. After this, when they complete eighth grade, they are now deemed a lead counselor.

“The biggest thing about what makes our camp work is the dedication of our camp counselors. These middle school and high school students are vital to the success of our program. Many of the high schoolers who are lead counselors now started camp at the age of 4 or 5. I cannot stress enough on how much their dedication to the next generation of music and theatre kids is appreciated,” Beck said.

FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIPS

Dr. Wojciechowski Donation to PCC Foundation

Pratt Community College is pleased to announce a gift and pledge of \$250,000 from Dr. Bill Wojciechowski. In 2018, Dr. Wojciechowski and his wife Terri established an endowed scholarship at the college. Funds from this recent gift will be added to the William and Terri Wojciechowski Endowed Scholarship bringing the total balance of the fund to nearly \$300,000.

Dr. Wojciechowski left an indelible mark on the institution, spearheading initiatives to enhance academic programs, foster community engagement, and ensure the college's financial stability. His visionary leadership transformed Pratt Community College into a thriving educational hub, dedicated to empowering students with the knowledge and skills needed to succeed in their chosen fields.



In May of 2013, PCC's Board of Trustees showed their appreciation to Dr. Wojciechowski by renaming East Hall and dedicating it as the Dr. William Wojciechowski Hall in his honor. The facility is a co-ed residence hall and offers apartment-style living amenities for 72 students. At the time, Dr. Wojciechowski stated "I was shocked and surprised. It was quite the honor. Anytime people go out of their way to recognize a person, it's a great feeling to know that people appreciate your hard work." He further shared "In the 24 years I have worked here there hasn't been a day that I didn't look forward to going to work."

Affectionately referred to as "Dr. Woj," he came to PCC following a career in the U.S. Air Force, attaining the rank of Colonel. Vice President of Students Lisa Perez-Miller remembers that he had a painting in his office with images under the words "Watch-A-House-Key." He often joked with students, saying they couldn't graduate until they could pronounce his name correctly.

During his presidency he oversaw, construction of the Riney Student Conference Center; national accreditations for the nursing, automotive technology, and business programs; reinstatement of the wrestling program; creation of the EduKan consortium; and the college received national recognition for its community service and was named to the President's Community Service Honor Roll. He also helped the formation of the South-Central Kansas Nursing Partnership and saw the PCC Foundation grow to a value of \$3.4 million. Other construction projects under his watch included Stanion Stables, North Hall, Dudrey Scholarship Hall, Chandler Hall, three wind turbines, and East Hall. Dr. Wojciechowski was recognized by the Association of Community College Trustees as the Western U.S. Region CEO of the Year (1994), honored by Phi Theta Kappa as one of the ten Outstanding College Presidents in the U.S. (1994), and received the Michael Bennet Lifetime Achievement Award (2013), the prestigious national award recognizing his commitment and support of Phi Theta Kappa honors society.

FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIPS

“The commitment that Dr. Wojciechowski has to Pratt Community College is incredible. Having had the privilege of working with Dr. Wojciechowski for over twenty years I can say that every day his focus was on PCC as well as its students, faculty, and staff. His dedication and commitment to PCC was contagious which allowed the College to achieve a high level of success in all areas during his presidency.” Stated Vice President of Finance and Operations, Kent Adams.

Dr. Wojciechowski served on a number of community, state, and national boards during his professional career. After retirement, Dr. Wojciechowski and Terri made annual gifts to fund scholarships for PCC students, as well as regular gifts in support of PCC Performing Arts. Terri passed away in August of 2022.

This scholarship is a testament to the enduring legacy of Dr. Wojciechowski's leadership and commitment to education. Recognizing the importance of providing financial support to students, Bill and Terri championed the creation of the endowed scholarship as a means to make education more accessible. With their generous donations, they have established a perpetual source of funding that will benefit students for years to come. The scholarship reflects their deep-seated belief in the transformative power of education and his unwavering commitment to creating opportunities for those seeking to better their lives through learning. Pratt Community College will be eternally grateful for their efforts and generosity.

“We are so grateful for the gift from Dr. Woj. He made a huge impact during his 24 years as president of Pratt Community College. His hand prints are all over the campus in facilities, programs and commitment to student success”, stated current PCC President Dr. Michael Calvert. “With this gift he continues to make impacts and help change lives in perpetuity. You can't do any better than that.”

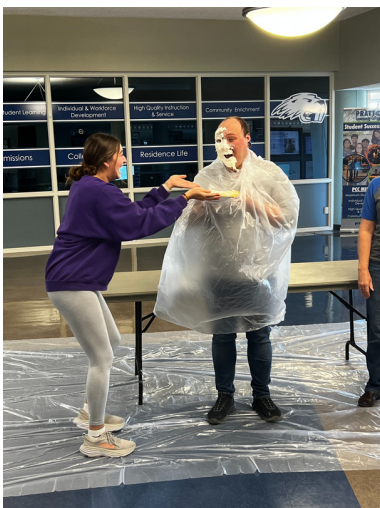


PHI THETA KAPPA

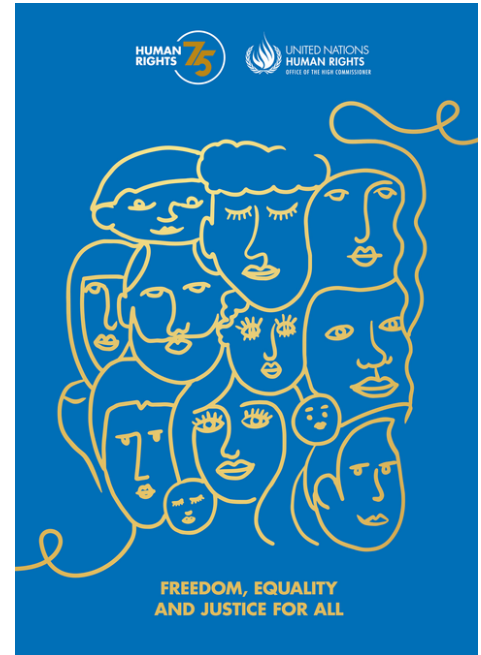
Universal Human Rights Month

Beaver Esports Makes It to NJCAA Playoffs

The Beaver Esports team has qualified for the NJCAA playoffs that will start on Monday, November 27. This semester, three teams have been competing in Fortnite (No-Build), Fortnite (Build), and Overwatch 2, and all three teams have qualified for the playoffs.

Head Esports Coach Charles Keefer is elated about this year's performance, "It is the first time during my tenure that every team competing in a particular semester has qualified for the postseason. We have a lot to be proud of, but the job is not finished as we look to win the first postseason matches under my tenure."

In the first round of the playoffs, the Fortnite (No-Build) team will be the ninth seed and will face the 24th seed Pensacola State College. If they advance to the second round, they will face one of the SUNY Jefferson teams. The Fortnite (Build) team will be seeded tenth and will play against the seventh seed Louisburg College in the first round. The winner of that match will face the second seed Union College. The Beavers faced Louisburg earlier in the season and lost 2-0. Both teams consist of Christopher Whitaker and Samuel Kelly. The matches are set for November 27 and 28 at 5:00 PM.

"The Fortnite team has done well this semester and should be proud of what they accomplished during the regular season," says Coach Keefer. "We have been stronger in no-build, and I believe we could make a run through this tournament if we can maintain that success. The build mode has been more of a struggle for us, but in the last few weeks, we have been improving and are ready to peak here in the postseason."

The Overwatch 2 team has had a busy fall semester. They have competed in the NJCAA Contender Series, participated in a preseason tournament at Highland Community College, finished seventh, and are currently competing in the Wildcat League, a league made up of community colleges around Kansas and one college in Nebraska. The playoffs for that league will take place in person at Kansas State on December 9.

The team consists of Deven Anderson, Kody Canfield, Carlos Pedroza Garcia, Jack Shaffer, and Jeremiah Goebel. They will finish the regular season 3-3 with a 20th seed in postseason play. The team will open against the 13th seed University of South Carolina-Sumter in the opening round. The winner will advance to either Iowa Western or State Fair. The opening round is set for November 29 at 5:00 PM.

"The Overwatch 2 team has had an up and down season, with a successful start to the semester at the Highland tournament and now qualifying for the NJCAA postseason and potential the Wildcat League semifinals," says Coach Keefer. "The team has gone through a roster change in the last month, which has presented several challenges, but the team is starting to feel comfortable again with each other and in their skill sets. We are ready to take the next step and win a postseason match."

Beavers Defeat Tabor College (JV)

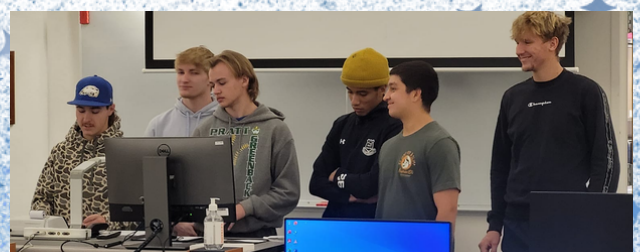
