Board of Regents Announces 2019 Fall Semester Enrollment

Preliminary figures released Wednesday by the Kansas **Board of Regents** (KBOR) show a slight decrease at state universities and systemwide in full-time equivalency (FTE) enrollment of students at public higher education institutions in Kansas.



Enrollment for Pratt Community College is also down 1.58 percent compared to Fall 2018. However, with the enrollment increase this past summer our current academic year enrollment is up 0.3 percent.

PCC FTE is at 861 students compared to 875 this time last year. FTE is calculated by dividing the total number of undergraduate credit hours taken in a semester by 15.

In the two-year sector, enrollment was down across the state's 19 community colleges with a reported decrease of 1,164 FTE students (-2.79 percent). Enrollment increased across the state's technical colleges, where an additional 165 FTE students (2.86 percent) are enrolled this fall compared to the preliminary census day count in 2018.

While overall Fall enrollment is down, the high school student population enrollment is seeing a 2 percent increase over last Fall. The College Start Program at PCC was started as a partnership with area high schools to help their students get a jump start on their college career. These students are provided the opportunity to earn college credits while still in high school. High School students are eligible for reduced tuition on all courses (excluding EduKan) and may take Career Technical Education classified courses tuition free. Nathan Knight, New Instructor But Familiar Face At PCC

The Pratt Community College Nursing Program faculty is growing with help from one of their own graduates. PCC alumnus and current Adjunct Instructor, Nathan Knight, has joined the faculty after years of experience working in the emergency medical field as a Registered Nurse. Knight joined the Adjunct Faculty this fall.

One of Knight's main goals for his class is to prepare students in the on-campus clinical setting to be successful at the off-campus facility setting. He also aims for the students to be well-versed clinical nurses in their future nursing careers.

"There is an Assessment Technologies Institute program that is used throughout the entire nursing program," said Knight. "The ATI program helps the students become clinically sound registered nurses as well as pass the final crediting National Council Licensure Examination."

Knight's favorite parts about being an instructor at PCC are seeing the students grow educationally as well as professionally, working along-side great educators, and being a mentor for the students.

Before becoming a nurse, Knight worked as a paramedic. His previous paramedic background has been beneficial to his nursing career by helping shape his emergency medicine skills, medication deliveries and procedures. Which he has been able to further expand on upon working the emergency department as a RN.

Knight received his Bachelor of Science from Bethel College in 2012, then continued on to Hutchinson Community College and earned his Associate's Degree with Paramedic Licensure. Shortly after, he attended Pratt Community College and earned his Associate's Degree in Nursing, RN Licensure. He then earned his Bachelor of Science Nursing Degree from Bethel College. He is currently studying at Frontier Nursing University and pursing his Doctorate of Nursing Practice, Family Nurse Practitioner and expects to graduate in the spring of 2022. While continuing his education, Knight also worked at Reno County Emergency Medical Services from 2014-2019. Knight has been employed at Hutchinson Regional Medical Center in the Emergency Department as a registered nurse since 2016.

PCC's Licensed Practical Nurse Program Continues Showing Years of Success

The Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN)
Program has had many years of
success at Pratt Community College.
PCC's PN Program has consistently met
or exceeded licensure examination
pass rates, with the last three years
being above 83 percent as well
as implementing new modern
technologies to help students take
classroom lessons into real-world
simulations.

"The pass rates for the NCLEX exam have consistently been around 90 percent for the last two years in the PN program," said Diana Mitzner, Director of Nursing.

The Kansas State Board of Nursing (KSBN) requires nursing programs to maintain an annual first time candidates' pass rate on licensure examination National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX) of 75 percent or greater.

"I love our facilities and skills labs," said Mitzner.

The PCC Nursing Program offers classes and hands-on training at two locations in Kansas. Students can enroll in either the Pratt or Winfield campuses. Both locations offer in classroom courses and hands-on training simulation lab equipped with lifelike patient mannequins. With the help of the mannequins, low pressure environment, and faculty that is experienced in the field, students are able to gain valuable knowledge and a chance to remember their training and make timely decisions for their patients.

One experienced faculty member is new PN Instructor, Amy Giefer. Giefer graduated from PCC in 2014 and worked as a charge nurse for 5 years at Wheatlands Health Care Center. This fall Giefer returned to PCC, but this time as an educator. Alongside teaching, she is also pursuing her Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Chamberlain University School of Nursing.

"The class sizes are smaller since I attended school here and we currently use a new program for nursing students called Sim Charts," said Giefer.

The nursing program has evolved over the past couple of years. Some evolutions include the use of Assessment Technologies Institute, ATI, which creates tests to help students apply textbook lessons to real world scenarios. The students are able to learn skills in the lecture classroom and practice them in the skills lab. They start at a basic level and build up. At the basic level, they learn symptoms of different scenarios and once they learn the textbook symptoms, they begin the simulation with the mannequins. The mannequins are programmed to show specific symptoms and the students observe and diagnose them. Another addition is the Sim Charts, they help students learn how to document in an electronic record. The Sim Charts also help further develop students' critical thinking skills and provides instructors with tools such as case studies.

"The skills lab helps promote interaction and critical thinking." Said Giefer.

A recently added feature in the classrooms is "Z Campus", which is known as zoom video. It allows the instructors to virtually teach from one campus to the other. Lessons happening in Pratt are live streamed to a classroom at the Winfield campus. Students are able to interact at the other location and learn from instructors in real time.

Shooting Sports Team Takes on Prairie Circuit Conference Championships

The Pratt Community College shooting team traveled to North Platte, Neb. last weekend to compete in the Prairie Circuit Conference Championships. The Beaver shooters placed second in the two-year division, falling to the hosting school, Nebraska College of Technical Agriculture, by just seven targets.

Schools shot 100 targets in five events- only the top five shooters scores count towards the team score.

Pratt started the three day shoot on the skeet field. Sophomore Spencer Heise led the team, breaking 84 targets. Freshman Brayden Smith was close behind, shooting an 83. Drew Kratzer, a second year shooter, and freshman Kendall Beitz both shot 75 targets. Caleb Fisher rounded out the squad breaking 72 targets.

Freshman shooters posted two of the top three scores for Pratt in doubles skeet. Heise, Fisher and Beitz all broke 78 out of 100 targets. Kratzer and Smith both shot 73s, giving PCC a team score of 380, just nine targets behind NCTA.

Saturday, light rain and strong winds made for a tough day shooting. Kratzer led the Beavers with a 92. Freshman Caleb Hinck added his first team score with an 85. Smith shot an 80, Beitz a 79 and Fisher broke 77 targets. NCTA broke 424 targets, 11 more than PCC, to pull further ahead in the high overall team score.

The Pratt squad made up some ground on the sporting clays course. Kratzer and Smith again led the team, shooting 79 targets. Heise regrouped after a tough trap shoot to post PCC's third score of 72. Beitz shot a 64 and Fisher shot a 63 for a team total of 357.

The shoot finished up Sunday with doubles trap. PCC had the highest score in the two year division, beating second place NCTA by more than 30 targets. Kratzer took the top spot for PCC with an 82. Fisher carded a 73, Smith and Hinck both shot 72s and Beitz took the final spot with a 66.

This was the second year that Pratt has taken second behind NCTA.

The Automotive Technology department at Pratt Community College is fully certified by the National Institute for Automotive Service Excellence Education Foundation (ASE). The automotive technology students work in a shop environment with state of the art equipment they will find in the auto industry. Students have the opportunity to earn an occupational certificate or an Associate of Applied Science degree. Students will also have the chance to participate in a race car project, car shows and several other activities. PCC Signs 2+2 Business Agreement with Wichita State University

Pratt Community College and Wichita State University recently partnered together to offer a 2+2 agreement for business students. With this agreement, students take classes at PCC for two years and earn their Associates of Science degree. Then transfer to WSU and in two years' time earn their Bachelor of Business Administration degree.

"They can feel confident what they take at PCC will be accepted and transfer at WSU," said Carol Ricke, PCC business instructor.

The requirements to continue on to WSU are earn an Associates of Science degree

at PCC, achieve a minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.25, and apply for admission to WSU. With the completion of these requirements the students are guaranteed to be admitted to WSU with 64 credit hours and junior status.

"We will be able to help advise students better for transferability" said Ricke.

With an end goal in mind and the classes laid out for them it takes much of the guesswork out of scheduling and helps students work toward graduating.

"At PCC students will gain the knowledge and skills that will help them be successful at WSU. This agreement also helps expand opportunities for the students," said Ricke.

The 2+2 agreement went into effect at the beginning of the 2019-2020 academic year. Alongside the business 2+2 agreement, PCC and WSU also partnered together for an engineering program 2+2 agreement.

Women's Cross Country Jumps Seven Spots in Rankings

The women's side of Beavers' cross country continues to gain traction on the national stage.

Today, in the second release of the NJCAA DI Cross Country National Coaches' Poll, the Beavers' women's team jumped from 23rd to 16th. Pratt's movement of seven spots within the Top 25 rankings was the largest leap of any team in the poll. The remainder of the rankings can be found here.

Pratt's maneuvering up the rankings comes after five Beaver women placed ninth at the Sept. 21 Southern Stampede in Joplin, Mo. with a team score of 231. Shantierra Jackson led the pace for Pratt over the course of the five-kilometer

race, finishing with a time of 19:28.2, the 12th-best time out of a field of 147 runners. Patricia Koma (20:38.8, 36th), Jamie De La Torre (20:54.2, 44th), Kalen Aguero (21:51.8, 75th), Serena Blaske (23:12.1, 96th), and Meadow Valeriano (24:49.1, 113th) also contributed to the Beaver effort.

This weekend, cross country will have the opportunity to expand on its early-season success in Fayetteville, Ark., where the Beavers will be running in the 31st Annual Chile Pepper Festival.



Josh Campbell Named Track & Field Head Coach

Following the departure of head coach Jamaal Barnes, who accepted a position on the track & field staff at Southern Mississippi University, Pratt Community College has named Josh Campbell to the same position.

Campbell, who most recently served as an assistant coach as well as the recruiting coordinator at Kennesaw State University for seven seasons, specializes in sprints, hurdles, and relays. The Chicago State University graduate also has experience instructing horizontal jumps, the high jump, and javelin throw.

"We are extremely pleased that Coach Campbell accepted our offer to become the Head Track coach at Pratt Community College," said athletic director Tim Swartzendruber. "His background at the Division I level and overall experience will be positive for our student athletes. With our new facility, I am confident Coach Campbell will continue to build on the success of Coach Barnes and be able to add athletes in the throwing events."



A four-time letterwinner at Chicago State, Campbell was named team captain his final two years as a Cougar. After graduation, Campbell was among the foursome that held the school record in the 4x100m relay before the record was broken in 2018. He then joined the Chicago State staff as a volunteer assistant in 2011.

At Kennesaw State, Campbell assisted the development of 23 conference champions, 14 NCAA Preliminary qualifiers, six school record holders, and three Atlantic Sun Conference Championship record holders. He also coached Jocselyn Powell, a two-time USA Championships qualifier and NCAA All-American.

Campbell retains multiple certifications, including a USATF Level 1 certificate, USTFCCCA Sprint/Hurdle/Relay Specialist certificate, and a USTFCCCA Strength & Conditioning certificate.

Kansas All-Star Coaches Clinic Coming To Pratt

The Kansas All-Star Coaching Clinic has officially been scheduled to be held on the campus of Pratt Community College on Saturday, October 5.

The clinic begins at 8:30 am, with instruction being relayed from head coaches such as Dale Faber from Friends University, R.J. Allen from Newman University, and Sean Flynn of Pratt Community College. Demonstrations will feature college players on the gym floor with topics of discussion including junk defenses, pack line defense, full court pressure defense, early offense and quick decision-making drills. Headlining the activities is Indiana Pacers scout and former Cleveland State head coach Kevin Mackey.



Mackey orchestrated the original Cinderella story patrolling the Vikings bench when in 1986 when Mackey's team upset Bob Knight's Indiana Hoosiers en route to the Sweet 16. He will speak on the "Run and Stun" defensive pressure he implemented at Cleveland State, as West Virginia head coach Bob Huggins cites Mackey's system as the sole influence for "Press Virginia".

In addition to building the first mid-major power at Cleveland State, Mackey is known as one of the premier talent evaluators in professional basketball. When Larry Bird took over as President of Basketball operations for the Pacers in 2002, Mackey was his first phone call and subsequent hire. As a member of the Pacers front office, Mackey is credited for the selections of six-time NBA All-Star Paul George, Lance Stephenson and Myles Turner. As a college coach, Mackey is also credited for discovering the towering Manute Bol, as well as NBA All-Star Michael Adams and Boston College legend John Bagley.

In 1990, days after being featured in Sports Illustrated and signing a \$300K dollar extension at Cleveland State, a very public arrest cost Mackey his job. Following a stint at the Wellness and Aftercare rehab clinic in Houston, Mackey was banished to basketball's minor leagues for twelve years. While in career purgatory, Mackey sent over 100 players from obscure minor league teams to the NBA. When Bird called in 2002, Mackey was broke, between coaching jobs and working as a substitute teacher in Lorain, Ohio. He borrowed money from a local high school coach to pay for a suit and the Greyhound ticket to his interview in Indianapolis. Today, Mackey enters his 18th season with the Indiana Pacers and his 29th year sober.

Faber enters his 17th year at Friends University, where has masterminded four Kansas Collegiate Athletic Conference tournament championships. Faber is also a two-time KCAC Coach of the Year.

Allen enters his third season at Newman University, and has already reset the school record for wins in a season with 20. In his first season as the head coach of the Jets, Allen was named Coach of the Year in the Heartland Conference, the first coach in the history of the conference to win the award his first year in charge.

Flynn enters his second season as head coach of the Beavers, and has scores of coaching experience including time spent as a graduate assistant at Marshall University. Before becoming the head coach at Pratt, Flynn was an assistant coach at such institutions as Trinity College, Cloud County Community College and Pratt Community College.

Coach Kewley Discusses 2-0 Win in Tonkawa

In the midst of a six-match winless streak, a run of games that included only three goals for the Beavers' attack, Coach Kewley deemed it necessary to make some changes.

Those changes paid immediate dividends, as Pratt (2-7-1) was able to snag its second win of the season over Northern Oklahoma College-Tonkawa in a 2-0 victory. Coach Kewley discussed how he tinkered with his lineup, which included playing a defender in an irregular role.

"We moved a couple of guys into different positions," Kewley said. "I played Keenan (Kropp) and Kade (Kropp) up front, two big guys. Brad (Huslig) started in the back and the back four looked great."



With a conference game against Hesston College on the docket for Wednesday night, Kewley had a plan to infuse the Monday rotation with as many bodies as possible. With rest on his mind, Kewley walked away impressed with how the collective group contributed to the winning effort.

"It was very hot and humid, so we kept on making changes," he said. "The good thing was that the guys who did go on did the job. We didn't have a drop in standard. I told them when they go in, they have to make a difference. It was pleasing to see them maintain that standard and that's all I ask of them."

After a scoreless first-half, the Kropp brothers connected for the opening score, with Kade playing a terrific pass into the middle.

"He had good vision to see his brother," Kewley said with a laugh. "Keenan was screaming at him for the ball, and he finished it first time. It was nice to see that because we hadn't had a solid finish like that."

Not long after, Nadir Cano-Lorente received a throw-in from the right side of the field, created space for himself, and fed Joe Brett for the second score.

Kewley was quick to mention how the vast skillset of Kade Kropp allowed him to not only play him towards the top of the Beavers formation, but how the emergence of others allowed for Kewley to believe in such a change.

"The good thing about Kade is his versatility," Kewley said. "He can play up front or he can play in the back. The fact that Brad (Huslig) did such a good job in the back allowed me the chance to leave Kade up front."

The Beavers were long in search of a win, and Kewley understands how important it will be to carry that feeling into a pivotal conference game tomorrow. Considering where Pratt's start has left it, Kewley is looking for any added benefit in order for his team to squeeze into postseason play.

"We have to win this game because it's a conference game. Last year we were in exactly the same situation. We had to beat Northwest Tech and then Garden (City), and we did to finish fourth. We have to do that again this year. It's going to be tough."
