Two PCC Programs Receive Local Grant

The PCC Library and Performing Arts Department each received a grant from the local South Central Community Foundation (SCCF) on Nov. 3. SCCF offers annual Community Grants to nonprofit organizations from their seven county service area including Barber, Comanche, Kingman, Kiowa, Pratt, Rice, and Stafford County.



The Library received \$200 in grant funding and

will purchase a set of twelve multiculturalism books. Sandra Wagner, Director of Learning Resources, is receiving her Master's in Library Science at Emporia State University was introduced to a few of these books via her class on Multicultural Resources and Services for Libraries.

"These books help encourage students to read multi-culturally, to develop mainstream thinking, stimulate critical thinking, and allow the instructors to guide students to an awareness of globalization and what is required to live in a culturally diverse society." said Wagner, "Moreover, to attempt to keep pace in an ever-changing and enhanced curriculum in the Arts & Humanities at Pratt Community College. Also, this will give back to area patrons whom also participate in and enjoy diverse readings."

The PCC Performing Arts Department will use its \$900 grant for the Summer Music Theater Camp. This camp is for children that are at least four years old and have completed one year of preschool to students having just completed the fifth grade. The 2017 camp will be held June 12-24 in the afternoon and will present two shows at the end of camp.

"The Performing Arts Department has been blessed to receive grants from the South Central Community Foundation for several years. The contributions help us to defer costs related to camp and allows us to keep costs for campers down." said Misty Beck, theatre instructor.

Collegiate Farm Bureau Students Gain Experience in Leadership and Service

The Collegiate Farm Bureau (CFB) at Pratt Community College is learning and growing more than just your average Kansas crop. CFB President, student Garrett Geesling and Vice President, student Keenan Stultz, both sophomores and in their second year with the organization were able to attend the Collegiate Farm Bureau Leadership Retreat at Rock Springs earlier this Fall.

The event provided personal development, leadership training and an opportunity to build their networks and collaborate with their peers from chapters at other colleges and universities throughout the state.



"It was a great experience," said Geesling. "Being able to network with other students and people within the industry was very valuable."

At the retreat the colleges worked together to pack nearly 3000 meals that would be sent to Africa to feed young people. Each group also packed cases of meals to take back to their local food bank. Geesling and Stultz came home with a case of 60 meals to donate to the Pratt Food Bank.

CFB is no stranger to service within their community. The chapter volunteered their time to serve the dinner at the annual Chamber Gala in October. Last November they took part in a campaign called The Big Thank You where they rallied fellow students, PCC faculty, staff and the community to write letters to U.S. troops deployed overseas. All together they sent out more than 110 hand-written letters, drawings and thank you notes.

"Last year was the first year for us to be involved with the Big Thank You organization and it is something we want to do again in the future," said Stultz.

The CFB is also teaming up with PCC's Block and Bridle and the Agriculture department to put on a student focused ag fair this month. The event is called "Bringing the Farm 2Campus" and it will boast a day of education, fun, food and prizes.

"Bringing the farm to campus is all about connecting with everyone on campus and teaching them about agriculture and how the food we all eat is produced," said Geesling. "CFB is all about advocating for agriculture and there are so many people on campus who don't know what all farming and this industry is about."



PCC Vice Presidents Participate in Leadership Development Program

Kansas Community College Leadership Institute (KCCLI) has accepted two administrators from Pratt Community College to participate in a 9 month leadership development program sponsored by the Kansas Association of Community College Trustees (KACCT).

Kent Adams, vice president of finance and operations and Dr. Michael Fitzpatrick, vice president of instruction, will spend two days a month in various Kansas Community Colleges working on a variety of different topics including collaboration, assessing personal strengths, and effective leadership styles.

During their time with KCCLI, Adams and Fitzpatrick selected a leadership project to develop. Partnering with a local conglomerate Stanion Wholesale Electric, they have begun working on a new certificate program for PCC in Indian

"I am very excited for this opportunity." said Fitzpatrick, "I already notice the changes impacted directly from our involvement with KCCLI."

KDWPT Work with PCC Science Class

Pratt Community College students get a hands-on approach to environmental science with the Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks and Tourism (KDWPT) biologists.

PCC Science Instructor, Dave (Kip) Chambers teaches Environmental Science and regularly works with KDWPT to organize field trips for students. This semester Chambers' class took a field trip to the South Fork of the Ninnescah River in Lemon Park. Students learned about the ecology of a small Kansas stream through various hands-on activities. KDWPT provided support for the project. Five biologists, Mark Van Scoyoc, Ryan Waters, Jeff Conley, Emily Dutton and another Ryan Waters from KDWPT helped the students with several activities including the collection of macroinvertebrates and electro-shocking for fish. In addition to sampling fish and invertebrate communities, the students performed a habitat assessment. The project also included basic water chemistry and a written report about their results to help them understand more about the ecology of the river.

The South Fork Ninnescah is typical of many western Kansas rivers in that it is impacted by both point and non-point source pollution. Concerns in the watershed include sediment loading, nutrient loading and the introduction of non-native species. These impacts and others have a detrimental effect on the ecological integrity of the river.

"The objective of this project is to help students develop a basic understanding of ecology, an appreciation for our resources and a sense of stewardship for the land," said Chambers.

KDWPT has been providing support to PCC for this project for more than 10 years.

"Their support is critical to the success of this project," said Chambers. "My students and I would like to thank KDWPT and their biologists for their help with this project."



Jordan Stubbings Named KJCCC and NJCAA Player of the Week

Pratt Community College men's soccer ended the season on a high note. The Blue and White finished out with a 2-1 record in the final week of play. But for one of the Beavers, the season ended with national recognition for his play in the final three games.

Jordan Stubbings was named the player of the week not just from the Jayhawk conference, but from the NJCAA as well. During the final three games, Stubbings played a vital role in securing a 6-0 win against Northwest Tech on sophomore night. In the match, the sophomore forward gained two goals on three shots and had an assist on the last goal of the game.

Stubbings closed out the season against Hesston College in prime fashion. During the 7-1 victory for the Blue and White, he netted a hat trick on four shots and assisted on two other PCC goals.

With a week of five goals and three assists, Stubbings has proven why he is the KJCCC and NJCAA player of the week.



PCC Volleyball Team Holds Donation Drive

On their Oct. 19 match against Garden City Community College, Pratt Community College volleyball played for more than wins and losses. The Beavers took

part in gathering volleyball equipment for Samaritan's Feet youth volleyball mission.

Samaritan's Feet is a non-profit organization for the purpose of sharing hope with children in need by washing their feet, giving them a new pair of shoes, and helping them to believe that their dreams can come true. Samaritan's Feet is a growing movement of people willing to humble themselves as servants so that others might know the opportunity to a better life. Samaritan's Feet have had over 3,000 high school, city leagues, university and college coaches aid in the cause by coaching games, donating equipment, or managing practices in addition to making public appearances in their bare feet. With the cooperation between Samaritan's Feet and the volleyball coaching



community awareness has been raised which has helped provide shoes, free skills training and volleyball resources to impoverished children especially in the African continent.

Volleyball Coach Jenny Mueller brings her connection with Samaritan's Feet to PCC from her experiences with the organization at Pittsburg State.

"Samaritan's feet is an organization I became aware of last year. My mentor and well-known volleyball coach and colleague, Ibraheem Suberu, asked me if I would like to host an event at Pittsburg State University," said Mueller.

Mueller and the volleyball team wanted to bring this mission to PCC. Donations of gently used athletic shoes, socks and volleyball equipment are still being collected by the Volleyball team and Athletics department. So far they have received 13 pairs of shoes, several bags of new socks, two volleyballs, five sets of uniforms and knee pads. Donations were made by Pratt community members as well as one hundred dollars from the Pratt Walmart.

"This is another great example of providing service by PCC student-athletes," said PCC President, Dr. Michael Calvert. "Although the beneficiaries of this organization will provide shoes and equipment to children in Africa, the concept of community service is imbedded in the PCC culture. We appreciate the efforts of Coach Mueller and her team towards this great cause and thank the community of Pratt for their support."

Women's Soccer Players Make All-Conference

With the close of the regular season the KJCCC has selected the players who have performed exceptionally on the field as All-Conference players of the year. A couple of Pratt Community College women's soccer players were nominated for All-Conference.

The KJCCC has selected the 2016 All-Conference team. Pratt Community College men's soccer was well represented placing several players on both first and second team All-Conference.

Jordan Stubbings was the lone first team selection for the Blue and White. The sophomore forward was also selected as the KJCCC Offensive Player of the Year. Jordan had 14 goals and eight assists in 16 games this season for the Beavers.

PCC also had Nerlin Rivera, Simon Christidis, and Aaron Grant selected for the second team All-Conference. Nerlin had five goals and one assist this season as a forward for the Blue and White. Sophomore midfielder Simon Christidis set up the Beaver offense by leading the team with 15 assists and five goals this season. Defensemen Aaron Grant had four goals and one assist on offense while anchoring the defense for the Blue and White. This season Aaron played a key role in a Beaver defense that only gave up 24 goals and averaged 1.40 goals against per game.
